* **Bob Marvin:** Since 1980, Bob Marvin has served on the faculty in the departments of Pediatrics and Psychiatry at the University of Virginia. His work has focused on studying and treating attachment and other relationship problems in families who have children with chronic medical conditions, and more recently children who have been separated from their parents because of divorce, maltreatment, or foster and adoptive care. Dr. Marvin has been involved in developing and testing a number of research and clinical procedures for assessing attachment and caregiving behavior, has published widely in these areas of research and practice, and conducts workshops on these topics both nationally and internationally. Over the past five years, he has helped develop a number of programs in the Commonwealth of Virginia that are designed to improve Best Practices in the field of Child Welfare, especially foster and adoption services. From the Mary D. Ainsworth Child-Parent Attachment Clinic at the University of Virginia, he continues to train a wide range of professionals, as well as conducting clinical research, assessments, and intervention. www.circleofsecurity.org
